CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Pierce called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m.

Tonight's agenda and the March 4, 2024 minutes were approved.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Chad Brown attended the two conferences last week, both were well attended and he liked having them back-to-back. Partnering with USU was good. He appreciated Mr. Daugs' comment about spring runoff when the question asked was what other views and/or topics should be included in the Great Salt Lake discussions. Mr. Daugs suggested getting someone from a small irrigation company to provide their perspective of what it is like to try and shepherd water to their users. Mr. Brown's opinion is that the agriculture voice needs to be in that meeting and he thanked Mr. Daugs for voicing that thought.

Chairman Pierce asked if the Board had any thoughts/ideas. Ms. Simmonds suggested having both conferences at one location and combining academic and real-world group discussions. Mr. Lindley said his only concern is the ability to get Ag users to come to two full days of discussions; especially in the spring. A survey was sent out to everyone who attended hoping for responses and ideas for future planning. One suggestion was having the poster session during an extended lunchtime. Six members of the Board attended. Mr. Wheeler recommended reaching out to canal companies earlier, and Mr. Daugs agreed.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Ms. Simmonds reviewed the report. (-<u>Attachment 1</u>-).

The profit & loss performance report is a new report to help provide a better sense of what is brought in monthly vs. YTD. The second report details what funds were spent on and/or who funds were received from.

Mr. Anderson asked about cloud seeding and how that is quantified. Mr. Daugs said the state's new cloud seeding coordinator is working on the data and new programs.

MANAGER'S REPORT

Update on PL 566 Applications

The Logan River project comment period closes on April 10. Older comments will be included. Eric Franson reported that they had a good meeting with USU Facilities and the Water Lab last week and it was made clear that there are multiple alternatives and that no decisions have been made. From his perspective, it was nice to be recognized for listening to the public comments made last year and adjustments made to the alternatives, as well as trying to incorporate them into projects for the greater good.

Wellsville-Mendon change has been submitted for review, it has not been posted yet.

Porcupine – the PIFR was completed and is being reviewed to determine whether it will move forward.

Blacksmith Fork – waiting to hear if this project will move forward to PIFR process.

Conflict of Interest Form/ Ethical Conduct Form

Forms were handed out for members to complete.

Water Users Report

Mr. Hardman said there are always a lot of broad categories and subjects to choose from. He attended one that discussed flow meters; the State took a random look at 60 different meters – the majority of which were not installed correctly. Examples of how to install them correctly were shown. Ms. Neilson said the State Engineer is going to put funding toward guidance and education on this topic.

Mr. Hardman said there was an update on the Great Salt Lake Commission by Tim Davis. The feedback has quite a few comments. Chairman Pierce said Mr. Davis was appreciative of the feedback which included in part coordination, decisions based on best science and better air/water quality.

Mr. Hardman pointed out that the Division of Water Rights has revamped their website and more planning information is available. Mr. Randall asked if they were going to go back and try to fix some of the old appeals and filings from decades ago. Mr. Daugs said they are working on these. The State Engineer stated that some water rights in Cache County may be finalized with Idaho's re-adjudication process.

Mr. Hardman noted that the Department of Agriculture & Food has a flyer discussing why alfalfa is a good thing. Mr. Anderson said one acre of alfalfa provides enough pollen for a colony of bees. Mr. Daugs said in the Great Salt Lake Watershed, Ag water is 67% of the total.

Mr. Daugs recommended increasing the limit on the credit card because there was not enough to pay for the conference lunch this year.

Chairman Pierce suggested creating a one-page flyer commenting on the Bear River Study. The information could contain a link to the full report. Mr. Daugs agreed and also suggested sending it to cities to send out in their respective newsletters. Mr. Wheeler said it should also include other projects the Water District is working on. He said having a tri-fold at the next conference might be helpful.

Ms. Neilson would like to discuss the groundwater study and what the sampling of wells will include with the local mayors. Chairman Pierce also suggested the city managers' meeting that he will schedule. Another resource could be area public works directors. Ms. Neilson would like to get this done before the sampling begins in July.
